### Location and emergency numbers for:

- Food banks
- Grocery stores
- Bakeries
- Dairies
- Egg farms
- Restaurants that would be willing to participate

### Names and numbers for people who can cook for crowds:

- Church women (funeral and fund raiser committee women)
- School cooks
- Veteran organizations: American Legion, Am. vets, VFW, etc.

### Commercial stoves:

- Fire departments
- Schools
- Restaurants
- Large pots, pans and service platters and utensils for preparation and consumption

### Foods easily prepared to feed crowds:

- Chili
- Spaghetti
- Barbeque
- Vegetable or chicken and noodles soup

### Cups/glasses, table service, napkins, plates

### Foods with shelf life:

- Canned goods
- Water
- Dry cereal
- Powdered milk
- Peanut butter
- Jam
- Macaroni and Cheese
- Gatorade
- Infant formula

Paper/non food goods:

- Toilet paper
- Paper towels
- Hand sanitizers
- Baby wipes
- Batteries
- Matches

Trucks to ship or store food from food banks (including refrigerated trucks)

Phone numbers for:

- Local politicians and leaders
- EMS Personnel (Police/Fire/Ambulance personnel)
- Utilities:
  - Gas/electric
  - Water/sewer
  - Sanitation control companies.
- Babysitting personnel:
  - Nursery/daycare providers
  - Geriatric/handicapped
  - Nursing homes
- Local and surrounding Hospital Emergency Preparedness Coordinators and National Disaster Response Officials
- Pastors/mental health workers
- Crisis teams
- National Guard, Community, or Neighborhood Emergency Response Team members.
- Hardware stores and emergency contact numbers of available personnel.

Owners of:

- Generators
- Lanterns
- Large equipment such as tractors, end loaders, cranes, drills, Bobcats
- Horse trailers
- Kennels
- Semi trucks
- Ham radios
- O2 equipment and fuels:
  - Gas
  - Kerosene
  - Butane, etc.

Numbers for:

- Red Cross
- Salvation Army
- Church contacts
- Local outreaches in surrounding communities as well as the local community (with their main emergency resource people).

Check on the Appalachian Relief Project through Methodist Churches - large stores of furniture and miscellaneous needs.

Know State and County jurisdictions
